Whereas our PAN-India approach resulted in making a difference in the lives of approximately 800,000+ people from 22 States and Union Territories.

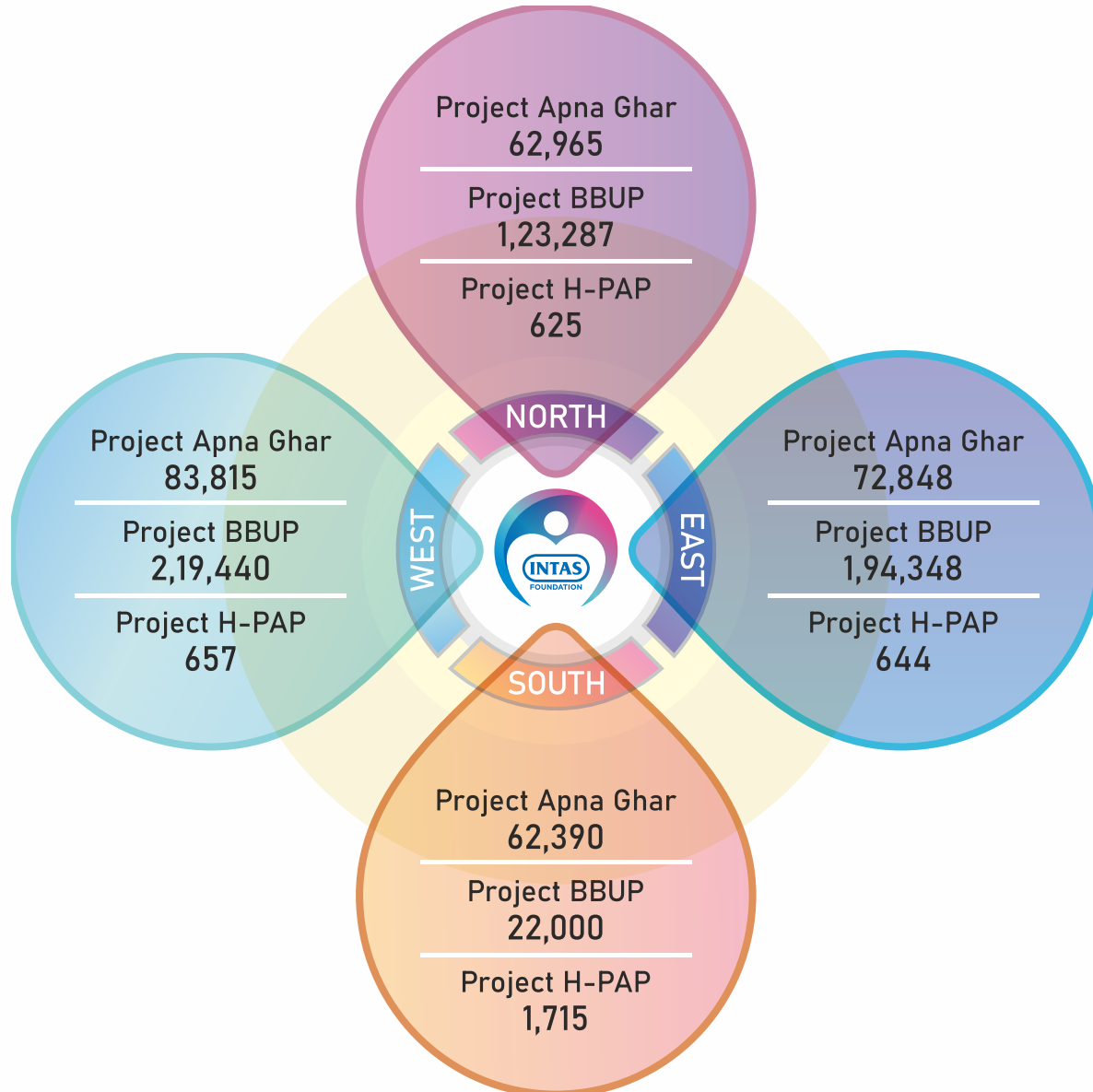

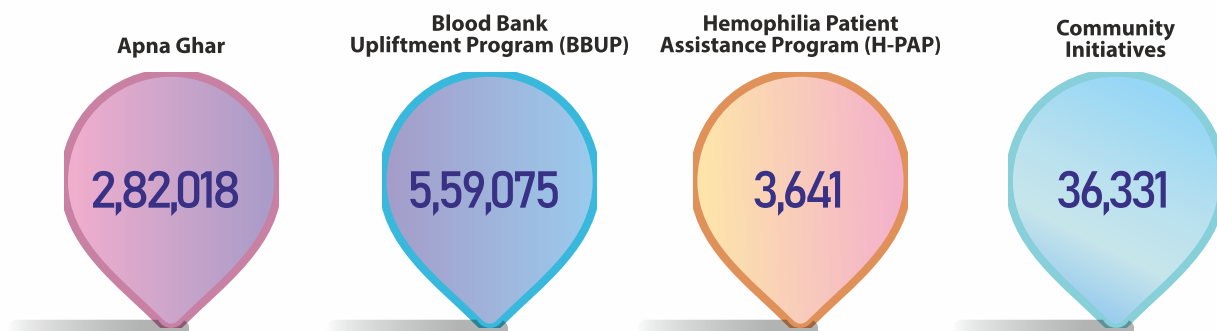

GRAND TOTAL



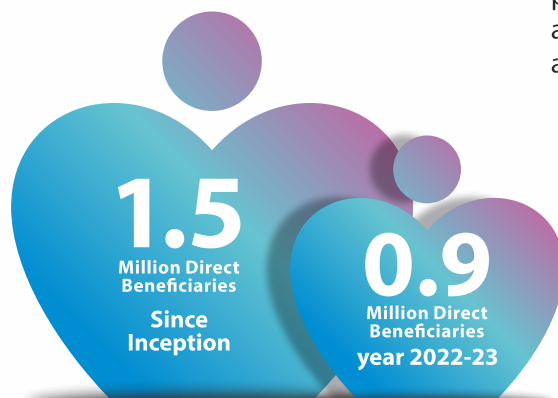
REACHING THE UNREACHED

Indian household's out-of-pocket expenditure (OOPE) on healthcare has been a major contributor to India's total health expenditure. This higher reliance on OOP expenditure is pushing approximately 55 million Indian population into poverty annually (WHO, 2022). The COVID-19 pandemic across the country has worsened the already higher per capita OOPE and has further impoverished families (*ibid*).

Most of Intas Foundation's programs are focused towards reducing the out-of-pocket expenditure of identified needy population through strategic impact investments and interventions. These interventions aim at strengthening accessibility of quality and affordable healthcare services. Non-medical OOPE such as transportation, accommodation and food for patients suffering with

chronic diseases were supported under Project Apna Ghar. Whereas Hemophilia Patient Assistance Program (H-PAP) improves accessibility of healthcare services to Persons with Hemophilia (PwH) in India, and Blood Bank Upliftment Program strengthens the ecosystem and thereby availability of quality blood for needy across the country.

The Foundation undertakes projects with proof of concept for impact investment in underserved thematic and geographic areas by deploying dedicated project teams across the country with expertise, knowledge and skills to improve overall quality of intervention. The projects are developed and designed to ensure benefits reach vulnerable and needy population. The project teams undertake extensive field studies to touch the last mile beneficiary and improve program outcomes. Towards this, the Foundation collaborates with multiple stakeholders and agencies such as hospitals, non-profits, government, social influencers, professionals and volunteers, to enable the stakeholders to provide a better quality of life for people.

THE YEAR THAT WAS

5A. Project Apna Ghar

Socioeconomic differences in cancer outcomes have been observed worldwide i.e. persons with lower socioeconomic status were likely to have higher cancer mortality rates (Takahiro Tabuchi, 2020). Therefore, integrated and collaborative efforts are required to ensure easy access to health care services. The advanced healthcare services and experienced medical professionals are largely concentrated around urban centres. According to a report by National Centre for Biotechnology Information (NCBI), about 95% cancer care and treatment services are concentrated in Urban India (Shripad Banavali, 2015). Thus, patients suffering from chronic illness, especially cancer, often find it difficult to cope with hardships and economic investment associated with long-term treatment regimens in major cities. Though subsidised medical services are provided by government institutions, non-medical out-of-pocket expenditure during treatment such as local travel, accommodation, food cost is largely borne by patient's families.

Project Apna Ghar piloted in 2019 to provide equitable access to healthcare services, improving patients' quality of life, and lowering their out-of-

pocket expenses. Contributing towards Sustainable Development Goals, the Apna Ghar facility was expanded to 20 cities across the country in 2021-22. During the year 2022-23, contribution was extended to establish additional 10 Transit Homes.

The project aims to create an enabling environment for patients suffering from chronic diseases by improving accessibility of healthcare services. This is achieved by leveraging resources through collaborations and partnership with government institutions, private sector, and civil society organizations. The project adopts evidence-based design and innovative strategies to optimise resources and program outcomes. Project teams undertake situational analysis of the region through series of key stakeholder interviews and resource assessment to evaluate the need for such service. The teams also undertake extensive research to identify suitable properties to accommodate patients.

During the year 2022-23, patients from 552 districts, out of total 766 districts in India, visited transit homes and availed Apna Ghar services.

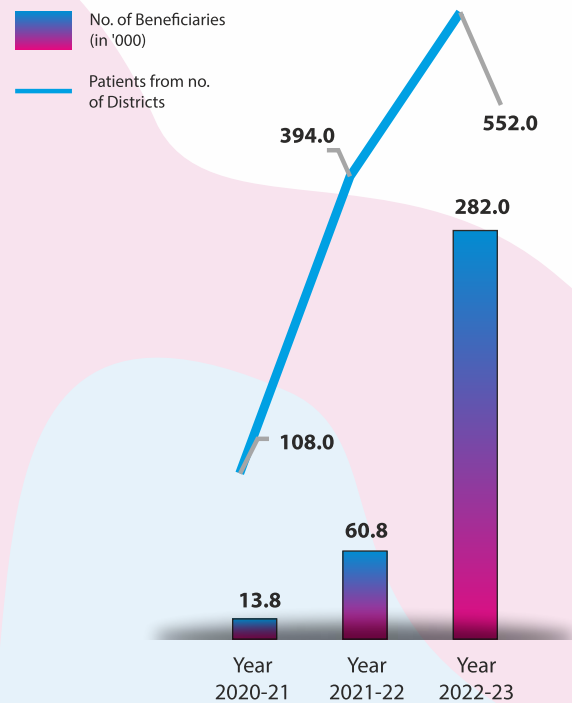
Accommodation Support at Apna Ghar

Access to quality and affordable accommodation during treatment is a major challenge for patients and their families in cities. Anecdotal evidence suggests that patients from rural and peripheral areas generally avail accommodation on sharing basis. It costs around Rs. 6,000 to Rs. 18,000 per month on recurring basis in smaller towns and higher in major cities. The cost varies based on city, location, type of accommodation, hygiene standards, and distance from hospital. Families who cannot afford basic facilities live in makeshift shelters. Besides accommodation, food and transport pushes the expenses beyond their reach. Eventually patients discontinue treatment.

Apna Ghar provides free accommodation to such patients and caregivers visiting from rural areas or far off places. Each Apna Ghar is equipped with facilities such as fully furnished dormitories, air-conditioned rooms, 24*7 drinking water along with other basic and recreational facilities. During the year 2022-23, about 282 thousand beneficiaries availed accommodation support in 22 States and Union Territories. The average length of occupancy per patient remained 5.6 days during the year. The rate of occupancy refers to

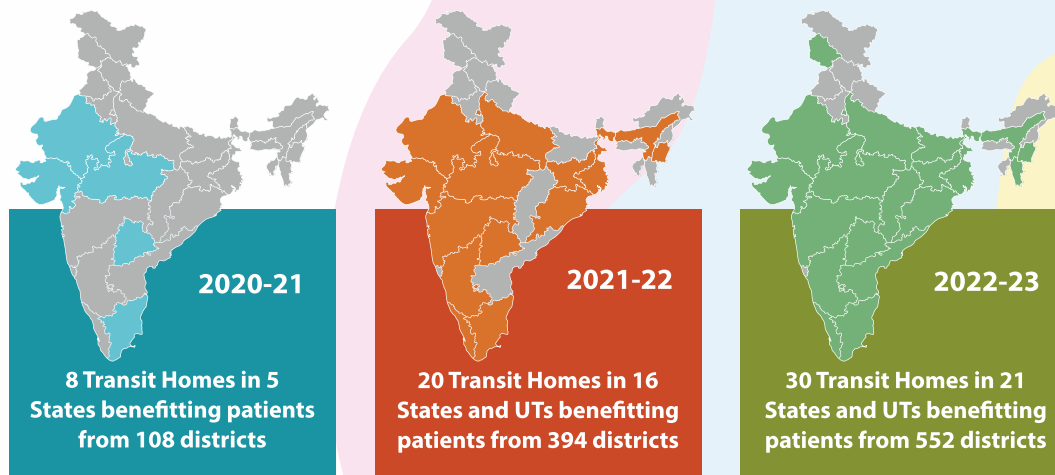
percentage of transit home beds remained occupied throughout the year. About 48% male patients and 52% female patients availed Apna Ghar services out of which about 34% patients were new, and 66% were repeat patients. Higher percentage of recurring patients reflects that there is greater need for such services and patients found the support useful.

Food Services at Apna Ghar

Nutritious food is important during cancer treatment. A healthy diet with a focus on plant-based foods can maintain a healthy body weight, maintain needed strength during and after treatment. Some patients find it difficult to maintain proper diet plan and therefore required nutrition intake. At Apna Ghar, patients and caregiver are provided with free nutritious meal throughout the year. In cases of any prescribed diet, Apna Ghar teams assist caregivers to prepare such food. Each Apna Ghar has a prescribed patient friendly weekly diet-chart keeping in view of

local culture and food habits. Practices of community kitchen is promoted to ensure optimum use of resources and a sense of being productive and supportive to each other during period of crisis. It builds a sense of belongingness, ownership and affinity among patients.

About **273 thousand** beneficiaries availed food services at Apna Ghar and about **572 thousand food units** were distributed. As response from the community growing day by day, at few locations sundry donors extended milk and grocery or tiffin service to patients. The Foundation sincerely acknowledges such collaboration and generosity of voluntary efforts.

Food Services at Apna Ghar during the year 2022-23 No. of Food Units (in '000)



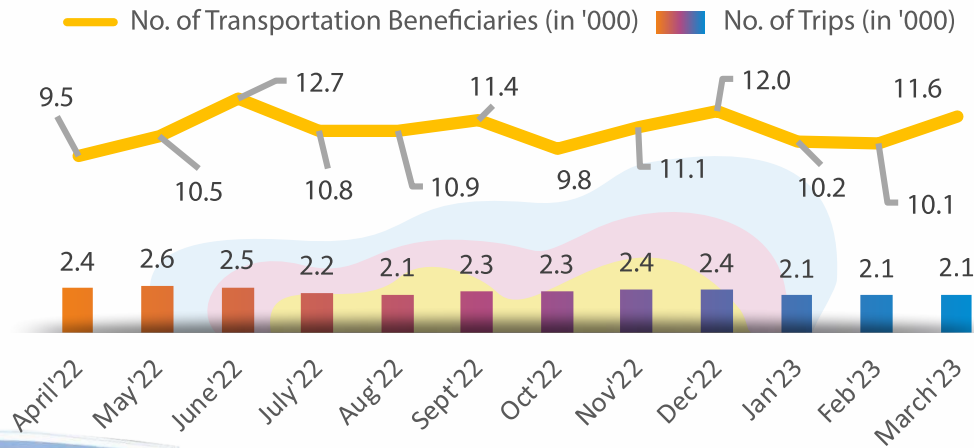
Transportation Services at Apna Ghar

In order to ensure safe commutation between Apna Ghar and treating hospitals each Apna Ghar is equipped with transporting vehicle (generally a 7-seater or 13-seater vehicle) along with a compassionate driver. Multiple trips are conducted at scheduled time slots between Apna Ghar and hospitals. About 27,000+ scheduled trips were conducted to transport 130 thousand patients and caregivers to hospitals at various locations.

Physical and Mental Wellbeing of Patients at Apna Ghar

Patient centric activities are regularly organized at Apna Ghar. Chronic illness like cancer can cause depression and mental health issues. Therefore, psychosocial counselling and engagement activities are aligned keeping in view of the socio-economic and cultural aspect of patients. These activities are aimed at creating awareness on health & hygiene, stress management, interpersonal relations, benefits of meditation, yoga, and awareness on various government and charitable services. Celebration of regional and national festivals, birthdays, and days of national significance are some prominent activities to keep the patients engaged and happy over their stay and during treatment. About 1,059 engagement activities were conducted at various locations in year 2022-23.

In addition to engagement activities, counsellors are recruited at each Apna Ghar to i) help patient and caregiver to cope with daily life, ii) encourage and provide motivational support, and iii) help patient to identify options and solutions to a better lifestyle. Multiple individual and group counselling sessions aim to empower patients and build their confidence. Counselors help patients to make their own choices and to explore ways to cope with treatment. Counselors also help to manage emotional issues and discuss ways to address and cope with any lifestyle changes that might occur during the treatment. About 7,362 individual and group counselling sessions conducted in year 2022-23.



5B. Blood Bank Upliftment Program

Blood banks play an important role in providing safe and quality blood components. In India, the demand for quality and safe blood is far greater than its supply. With approx. 1.4 billion population, the need for blood and its components is constantly increasing. In tandem with the ever-increasing requirement, there is a need to upgrade the existing blood bank ecosystem. Infrastructure, technology, human resource, and awareness are some of the major challenges blood banks face on daily basis.

Patients suffering with chronic blood disorders such as Thalassemia, Hemophilia, Sickle Cell Anemia, and others, need regular blood supplies during the treatment process. Apart from such medical conditions, medical emergencies during delivery, surgeries also need constant supply of blood components. Good Laboratory Practices (GLP), Good Manufacturing Practices (GMP) and adoption of advancements in blood collection and processing are vital to attain safety and sufficiency in blood supplies.

Under the Blood Bank Upliftment Program, INTAS Foundation aims to strengthen blood bank ecosystem in India by infrastructure development, capacity & knowledge building, awareness creation, and promoting voluntary blood donation.

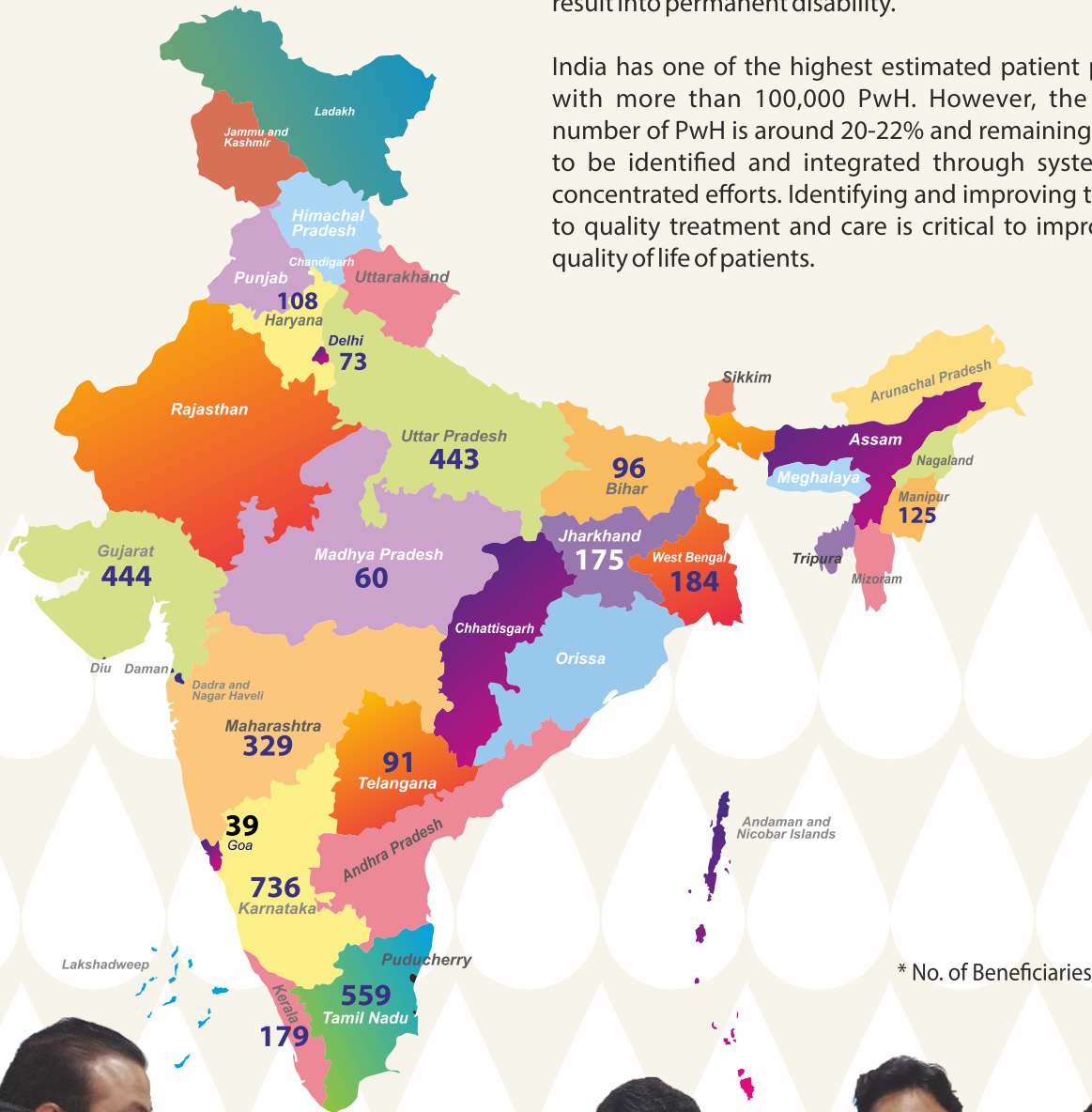
During the FY 2022-23, support was extended to 41 blood banks from 11 states and Union Territories. The assistance was towards i) strengthening blood processing ii) increasing storage capacity, iii) enhance augmentation iv) technological support, and v) competency development. The support aims to benefit approximately 559 thousand patients in accessing quality blood services.



5C. Hemophilia Patient Assistance Program

Hemophilia is considered a high-cost rare disorder, with 1 in 10,000 individuals suffering from bleeding disorders globally. Depending on the clotting factors level in Persons with Hemophilia (PwH), bleeding episode can arrest mobility or result into permanent disability.

India has one of the highest estimated patient population with more than 100,000 PwH. However, the identified number of PwH is around 20-22% and remaining PwH need to be identified and integrated through systematic and concentrated efforts. Identifying and improving their access to quality treatment and care is critical to improve overall quality of life of patients.



Haemophilia Patient Assistance Program (H-PAP), supported and implemented by INTAS Foundation, aims to improve treatment outcomes for PwH by providing Factor assistance, self-infusion training, physiotherapy assistance, diagnostic support and genetic counselling to patients and their family members. Patient Support Group (PSG) engaged in 16 States to assist the patient in treatment process.

In order to improve accessibility and availability of Factors, about 3,526 units of vials have been distributed to 1,685 PwH through 32 Factor distribution camps. Persons with Hemophilia from 14 States attended these camps.

Most of the PwH live in small towns and villages. During bleeding episodes they may need to travel long distance for treatment. The delay in treatment can further impact their health condition. To help patients undertake necessary preventive measures, self-infusion training camps conducted for 668 PwHs registered with Haemophilia Treatment Centers in 9 states. They are trained to self-administer Factor during bleeding episodes. By this, they can control further bleeding before they reach nearest treatment center. They also acquire dexterity in infusing themselves with antihemophilic factor concentrates.

It is widely known that majority of the episodes in PwH involve bleeding in the joints with the ankle being the third most frequently affected joint. Physiotherapy has been considered as an effective method for the improvement of acute joint injuries. To improve health outcomes, 1,288 PwH were capacitated through physiotherapy trainings conducted in 14 states. PwH are encouraged to practice physiotherapy at home on regular basis.

Cumulatively, during the year 2022-23, the program has reached 3,641 beneficiaries through 74 camps spread across 15 States and Union Territories.



5D. Emerging Initiatives

Intas Foundation is engaged in the areas of education, healthcare, sports, animal welfare, and community development.

Activities such as medical treatment assistance, sports equipment support, medicinal support, education support, school kits, and food kit have been provided to communities and groups across the country. About 21,000 + beneficiaries reached in 9 districts from Gujarat, Karnataka and Sikkim.

Through Medical Treatment Assistance Program, 2,841 patients supported for eye surgeries, leukaemia & myeloma, and other chronic medical conditions and critical surgeries. In addition to this, medicines were provided to government hospitals.

Food kits provided to 3,282 beneficiaries and 9,000 needy people through community kitchen managed

by a charitable trust in Ahmedabad. Cooked meals provided free of cost or at subsidised rate. To cultivate a physically active lifestyle and transformative well-being of people in urban areas, "Project iFIT" launched to impact 2,331 people across various locations. On similar lines, 75th Independence Day celebrated with the participation of about 400 citizens. Under animal welfare, two Gaushalas from Patan and Banaskantha districts in Gujarat provided support for procurement of medicines and fodder for livestock.

Interventions on improving educational outcomes included support to pharmacy college in Ahmedabad for the renovation of lecture hall, upgradation of the research facility and promoting entrepreneurship in pharmacy. The research facility and upgraded lecture hall aims to benefit post-graduate students, research scholars, innovators, and entrepreneurs. In addition, three schools supported for infrastructure development in Gujarat and Sikkim. Additionally, 2,000 students from 98 government primary schools were provided school kits in Gujarat.
